



Jimmy Ong

Born in Singapore, 1964.

Reading the work of Thich Nhat Hanh helps articulate and resolve my own conflict of growing up in a Confucious/Taoist/Buddhist household. Thich Nhat Hanh also points out the relevance of the hungry ghosts as a Buddhist *dharma* (teaching) known as Ullambana.

Study for Hungry Ghosts (Hulu Shrines) is a sketch of the Portable Prayer, an installation that parodies the private confessional in a public setting. Will sending a prayer through the personal computer redeem one's prayer like a printed receipt? Nevertheless, the artist hopes the process will prompt the viewer to recognize the hungry ghosts in us.

A description of the Portable Prayer installation:

The viewer is invited to enter a tent-like collapsible shrine in the shape of a hulu, or bottle gourd. The Hulu Shrine, intended for outdoor installation, is a makeshift temple wired to facilitate the private act of "connectivity" with a greater consciousness - the Internet. Once inside the shrine and seated before a computer terminal, the viewer inputs a prayer, which in turn is "encrypted" in a language of the viewer's choice. The encrypted prayer is posted in real time onto the website www.portableprayer.org, and woven together with other prayers onto a quilt-like webpage. After a period of 49 days, the prayer is "emancipated" by a software program that has been blessed in real time by a Buddhist monk.
